


# ANNUAL REPORT FY 2020-2021



# WELCOME



It is my honor to present the annual report summarizing the work of Center for Domestic Peace (C4DP) from July 1, 2020, to June 30, 2021.

This report is reflective of the impacts and changes to C4DP during the COVID-19 pandemic, during which board and staff have endured hardships in their lives, including the challenges of home schooling, health issues, and the loss of loved ones.

Yet amidst the hardship and challenges, COVID continues to teach us about our humanity and resiliency. Great clarity has emerged from this past year as we discovered how to work differently while offering services and programs remotely.

This summer as I read the book, The Hidden Life of Trees: What They Feel, How They Communicate, I thought about the commonality between trees and C4DP. Trees are "social beings" that communicate with each other through their roots. They share nutrients in hard times while also taking care of their young and injured, as trees intrinsically understand that even one tree compromised affects the well-being of the entire interconnected tree family.

We are that interconnected web of life, holding space and nurturing each other through a time of great hardship. And just as exposure to harsh weather conditions facilitates trees in growing deeper roots, so, too, has the harsh reality of COVID done for C4DP. This past year's performance has demonstrated that we can cope, learn, and grow from hardships and trials. We have learned that we can hold our own and not lose our footing from the intensity and threat of external forces. We have stayed steady and strong in our commitment to our roles, teams, and survivors while also extending care and support to each other as we have navigated personal challenges in dealing with the impact of COVID.

While there is always more to do, this past year's successes are cause for reflection and celebration. In closing, I celebrate all board and staff members for your heartfelt commitment to C4DP and your endless contributions that allowed us to meet COVID-related challenges while also moving our agenda forward to end domestic violence. I extend a special note to celebrate Kate Kain, Deputy Executive Director, for her wisdom informed steadfast leadership both internally within the organization and externally with our community partners. She helped us stay deeply rooted within the middle of the turbulence.

# A YEAR IN REVIEW

## **Options for Safety and Opportunities for Personal Transformation**

Safety: For those victimized by dating abuse and domestic violence, including their children, in ways and institutions that are responsive to their needs and address intersectionality issues impacting their safety.

Transformation: For those victimized by dating abuse and domestic violence for their personal transformation toward a future of greater safety, freedom, and equality. And for perpetrators of dating abuse and domestic violence to end their violence and need to control by transforming their beliefs and behaviors to promote safety, equality, and freedom.



Hotline calls answered in both English and Spanish

## **Community Responsibility**

The individuals and organizations in Marin County join C4DP in creating innovative and dynamic solutions that help end dating abuse and domestic violence.



Volunteers contributed 4,120 volunteer hours (1.98 FTEs)

# HIGHLIGHT

For 44 years, C4DP's strategic planning efforts have kept us focused and moving in the right direction toward domestic peace. Along the way, strategic planning has challenged us to stay current with survivor needs, question how to best leverage the resources we have, think deeper about how to fully engage our collaborators and the community, and question how we can fully live up to our long-standing commitment to social justice and equity.

C4DP's Board of Directors has recently approved a new three-year plan along with updated core organizational values. These updated directions combine what we know from more than 44 years of C4DP's theory and practice at work, new research conducted at the national and state level, and local trends and priorities in Marin. Woven throughout the strategic planning process was a commitment to understand how feminism has evolved from the early days of the organization's founding to our understanding of what it means to C4DP today.

C4DP recognizes that gender and sexual orientation are evolving realities that we continue to integrate into our response to domestic violence. We recognize that alternative ways of providing services – such as mobile therapy, out-posting in different locations, and offering services online – are just some of the strategies that increase C4DP's responsiveness to the needs of survivors, their children, and those who abuse.



We understand the power of a coordinated community response to domestic violence and move forward with a commitment to expand and deepen our work in this area. And we understand that to transform our culture to end domestic abuse and violence requires more deeply engaging youth, men and boys, and family members.

What holds this work together is C4DP's core understanding of feminism as an all-inclusive framework that promotes liberation for all people. We recognize the complexity and diversity of each individual person as we bring forth our work to create pathways toward freedom from violence. Toward that end, C4DP will increase our capacity to address oppression stemming from racism, sexism, classism, and anti-LGBTQ bias.

C4DP has stayed steady in moving the agenda to end domestic violence because we continue to be informed by the experience of survivors. Day by day, it is survivors who inform us if corrective course is needed and how to best respond. Survivors' experience of domestic violence and their urgency that it end is what keeps C4DP moving forward with clarity and determination. As such, listening to their voices is key to our success.

# STORIES OF HOPE



## **Finding Freedom**

At C4DP, participants accessing flexible funds are able to address their safety and build their independence while staying at C4DP's emergency shelter. Danielle and her daughter came to C4DP after experiencing a threatening, emotionally abusive situation. Danielle's partner installed cameras in their house, put a tracking device in the car, and did not let her or her daughter see family or friends outside their house.

One day on her way to work, Danielle decided to stop at C4DP's administrative office. She said she did not know what to do since her partner did not let her leave the house, and she was unable to take her child out of the house. A C4DP hotline advocate connected her with C4DP's legal advocacy services, which helped her contact the police. They assisted her in finally leaving the house with her daughter.

Danielle stayed at C4DP's shelter for two months, where C4DP advocates worked closely with her, providing support, empowerment, resources, and a connection to C4DP's therapy program. She also received food, diapers, and financial assistance through flex funds to spend a few weeks at a hotel after she left the shelter.

During this time, Danielle was able to find an apartment for herself and her child. She was very grateful for all the support and empowerment she received during one of the most vulnerable moments in her life. C4DP helped her become more self-sufficient and independent.

Danielle shared that she will always keep C4DP's shelter close to her heart because that is where her daughter first learned to walk.






