I am truly honored to present my inaugural annual report, reflecting the incredible work of Center for Domestic Peace (C4DP) during last fiscal year from July 1, 2023, to June 30, 2024. Since stepping into this role on April 15, 2024, I have been inspired by the profound legacy left by Donna Garske. Her unwavering dedication has not only built a strong foundation for our organization, but has also propelled us to strive for excellence in everything we do.

Over the past year, I have witnessed the unwavering passion and commitment of our staff. From those on the front lines providing vital services to the administrative team ensuring our operations run smoothly, it is evident that every member is making a meaningful difference in the lives of those we serve. Last year, we supported 2,808 survivors, offering them the resources and care they needed during some of their darkest moments.

I am particularly excited to share one of our innovative prevention initiatives that wrapped up this past year, which sought to engage young men and boys in transformative ways through the expressive art forms of poetry and rap. Through rap contests and collaborative sessions, participants explored their emotions, using poetry and rap as powerful tools for self-expression. It was heartening to see young men articulate their thoughts and feelings, breaking down barriers and challenging societal norms surrounding dating and domestic violence. The initiative not only allowed for artistic exploration, but also built a supportive community where empathy and respect could flourish.

We also navigated the challenges posed by potential cuts to Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) funding, joining statewide advocacy efforts to secure essential support at the state level. Our commitment to centering the voices of survivors in these discussions was instrumental, resulting in the successful allocation of \$103 million in the California budget to domestic violence and sexual assault providers across the state. This funding for C4DP is a critical lifeline, helping us continue our essential programs and services.





# WHO WE SERVE



Center for Domestic Peace (C4DP) is the sole domestic violence service provider in Marin County, dedicated to addressing the complex needs of individuals and families affected by domestic violence. With a comprehensive range of services, C4DP plays a critical role in the community by offering support, education, and advocacy.

C4DP Safety & Empowerment programs include a 24-hour crisis hotline, emergency shelter, transitional housing, legal system advocacy, and counseling services for survivors and their children.

Following this announcement, the board and staff, guided by Donna's leadership, initiated a national search for a new Executive Director.

Previously, she was the CEO of YWCA Glendale and Pasadena, where she played a crucial role in revitalizing the organization's 95-year commitment to supporting local women and girls. Her achievements include expanding programs, stabilizing the organization, fostering growth, and sparking cultural change and discussions aimed at ending gender-based violence and promoting racial equity. # PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT

## It's a R.A.P. (Raising Awareness & Prevention) of Dating and Domestic Violence

C4DP worked with Just Armour to host four events that engaged African American young men and women in using rap, hip hop, and poetry to talk about their experiences of dating abuse, witnessing abuse as a child, and the importance of preventing violence in relationships. All four events and workshops were created to be culturally immersive campaigns for young Black men to create hip hop music about dating and domestic violence (DDV).

A total of 108 young men attended these exciting new events where 35 Lyrical Preventionists shared their gifts of rhyme and poetry to address the issue of domestic violence through music.

One event was held in Marin City, engaging youth in roller skating and rapping about healthy relationships. The rap competition was judged by local rap artists and community members, and the winners received prizes. Approx. 50 spectators from the community cheered on the competitors.

The second event was held at a local African American barber shop and was a workshop for young men to receive a free fade haircut and “fade away DDV” by learning about the different types of abuse. Local rap artists shared their music about the impact DDV and other forms of abuse have had on their lives. Six local young Black men rapped about losing family members to DDV, witnessing abuse as a child, and feeling guilty for using abuse in a relationship and wanting to get help.

# STORIES OF HOPE

## Airman 1st Class Michelle Ferrari

While countless survivors have benefited from C4DP's support over the years, we want to highlight the inspiring journey of Airman 1st Class Michelle Ferrari. Recently, Michelle penned a poignant commentary about her experiences with abuse and her path to resilience, which garnered attention from various outlets, including recognition from the Pentagon. In a heartfelt message to us, she expressed her gratitude for the assistance provided during her most challenging times and emphasized that no matter how broken one may feel, there is always hope.

“Surviving an abusive relationship was one thing, but surviving the trial took some serious perseverance and determination to push through. It was extremely triggering. I was revictimized as I was judged, criticized, mocked, and belittled, but I was lucky. I won the case. Not many are.”

Though Michelle's narrative includes distressing accounts of physical abuse that we will not disclose, there was a pivotal moment when she stood before the Golden Gate Bridge, contemplating taking her own life. It was then she realized she needed to take action to prevent her abuser from hurting anyone else. She chose to leave and found refuge at a domestic violence shelter just across the bay. Her situation was complicated, spanning three different counties in the Bay Area, and it was at this juncture that C4DP's legal advocacy team stepped in, guiding her through the intricacies of the criminal justice system in Marin County.



“The life experiences I endured and how I overcame them shaped me into the resilient woman I am today. Through the pain, I learned how to survive, how to persevere, how to grow, how to treat others with compassion and how to forgive....” - Michelle Ferrari

Today, Michelle stands as a symbol of hope and is actively engaged in her community and the Air Force. She volunteers with the Air Force's SAPR (Sexual Assault Prevention and Response) program, has established a nonprofit ministry, and collaborates with local churches, domestic violence shelters, and law enforcement agencies.

Michelle Ferrari's journey is a testament to the power of resilience and the importance of community support. Her story is a reminder that, even in our darkest moments, there is always hope for a brighter tomorrow.




# STAFF, VOLUNTEER, AND BOARD DIVERSITY


### Staff Demographics
